- 6. Figures and tables must be numbered and captioned underneath.
- 7. Please <u>send the abstracts</u> as a Word-file and a PDF-file

The body of the abstract is limited to 400 words (excluding headings). Please include the following sections in your abstract: Background/Purpose, Objective, Methods, Results, and Conclusion.

## **Research Topics**

Abstracts should describe research relevant to one of the following topics:

1. Victims of violence, especially against Females and Children (cases of physical-, se xual- violence)

2. Forensic Medicine (e.g., Forensic pathology, forensic imaging)

3. Identification, conservation and preservation of human remains (DNA-Analysis, anthropology, and archaeology, management of the dead)

4. Biometrics (e.g., securing of evidence, methodology of criminal technical units, management of crime scenes)

5. Legal Issues (e.g., transplantation law, tissue law, cornea transplantation, cornea bank set-up)

6. Psycho–Social Aspects (e.g., gender-based violence, posttraumatic stress disorder)

7. Medical Education (proposal for the development of a curriculum for medical students in forensic medicine and postgraduates concerning specialization in Forensic Medicine)

8. Research projects in the field of forensic sciences
