



The quantity and quality of our research publications is increasing. We have an approved Strategic Plan with a road map for implementing a number of reforms to make UR a better run University both academically and administratively.





This event attracted around 180 educationalists from over 20 countries to discuss practical mechanisms to confront the issue of quality and scarcity of teachers iat all levels of education.

University of Rwanda 4th Graduation ceremony





R held its 4th Graduation ceremony which saw 8,366 graduands conferred with their degrees in a ceremony at Amahoro Stadium. 275 graduates were awarded Masters degrees while 311 were awarded Postgraduate Diplomas. A total of 5,873

graduated with Bachelors degrees, while 985 graduated with Advanced Diploma and 919 with Diploma. On the occasion, 2 graduated with PhD adding to other 19 UR academics who graduated from other universities in the same year.

Occupational Therapy and Early Intervention and Special Needs Education Assessment. The Centre will develop collaboration with the UR-CMHS School of Health Sciences in Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy through its Clinic.






brought together visitors from outside the country and different public and private institutions working in Rwanda. The objective of the event was to connect students, UR alumni, staff and employers.





Dr Maryse Umugwaneza during graduation from North-West University, South Africa

Reversing the Tide: Diagnosis and Prevention of Diabetes in Africa

The College of Medicine and Health Sciences hosted a Public Lecture under the theme: "Reversing the Tide: Diagnosis and Prevention of Diabetes in Africa". The purpose of the lecture was to encourage early screening tests and timely interventions to decrease the impact of the disease that is now occurring at highly alarming rates worldwide. The lecture was given by Prof. Anne Summer, a Senior Investigator at National Institute of Diabetes, Digestive and Kidney Diseases at the National Institute of Health in the USA.

She noted that "Diabetes is reaching epidemic proportions in people globally". To reverse this trend and improve longevity and quality of life, clarity on the causes of the disease and improved screening is necessary and also change our consumer and nutritional behavior.



Increasing visibility of UR publications at international level

n collaboration with Clarivate Analytics, the University of Rwanda organized a 2-day training on Web of Science resources. The training was attended by African Centers of Excellence PhD students, researchers, staff and UR partners. It aimed to increase visibility of UR publications at international level, to strengthen the academic capacity in research and register of UR papers in international webometry systems.





Bringing together staff and students for community service






Visiting senior six leavers at ITORERO


University Student Business symposium



Commemoration of the 1994 Genocide against Tutsi





Boosting social entrepreneurship capabilities in Rwanda

niversity of Westminster students visited the University of Rwanda as part of a transformative ninemonth programme collaboration via inter-university teams to generate ideas for social enterprise projects in Rwanda. The students joined colleagues for a nine-day social enterprise and cultural retreat to learn about Rwandan economy and society, be inspired by Rwandan social entrepreneurs and further design, develop and refine their projects, receiving feedback on how to

take their projects forward to the next stage.

The programme, funded by the Quintin Hogg Trust Foundation with the additional support of two leading Rwandan banks – BRD and BDF, offered students the opportunity to develop essential employability skills including cross-cultural communication, project management, business strategy and management.

Collaboration with L.E.A.F Pharmaceuticals

he University of Rwanda signed a Memorandum of Understanding with L.E.A.F. Pharmaceuticals LLC to promote and strengthen academic and research collaboration. During the signing, L.E.AF was represented by its Founder and CEO, Dr Clet Niyikiza.

In addition, a collaboration agreement with L.E.A.F. Rwanda was also signed aiming at ensuring upgrade, management and maintenance of biotechnology laboratory and knowledge transfer in research.

L.E.A.F. Rwanda is a subsidiary of L.E.A.F. Pharmaceuticals whose focus is on making Rwanda a hub for Biotechnology research and development. It is looking forward to making Rwanda the center for pharmaceutical manufacturing in Africa. L.E.A.F. Rwanda agreed to collaborate with UR as the national university in developing Rwandan expertise and capacity in biomedical research and development using the existing biotechnology laboratory. The company also pledged to upgrade UR's biotechnology laboratory to meet international standards.







Extension of collaboration with the Government of Sweden towards Research capacity building
